

Fund description and summary of investment policy

The Fund invests in a focused portfolio of companies with significant business interests in Africa, regardless of the location of the stock exchange listing. The Fund price is reported in US dollars but the underlying holdings are denominated in various currencies. Returns are likely to be volatile.

Fund objective and benchmark

The Fund aims to outperform African equity markets over the long term without taking on greater risk of loss. The Fund's benchmark is the MSCI Emerging and Frontier Markets (EFM) Africa Index (total returns).

How we aim to achieve the Fund's objective

We invest in shares that we believe offer superior fundamental value while taking into account risk and return. We research companies and assess their intrinsic value based on long-term fundamentals; we then invest in businesses where our assessment of intrinsic value exceeds the share price by a margin of safety. This approach allows us to identify shares that may be out of favour with the market because of poor near-term prospects, but offer good value over the long term. The Fund's holdings will deviate meaningfully from those in the index both in terms of individual holdings and sector exposure.

Suitable for those investors who

- Seek exposure to African equities
- Are comfortable with stock market and currency fluctuations
- Are prepared to take on the risk of capital loss
- Typically have an investment horizon of more than five years

Capacity

The Fund currently has limited capacity. Allan Gray Bermuda Limited (the 'Investment Manager') may, at its discretion, refuse a subscription or phase a subscription into the Fund over a number of dealing days. Redemptions may be limited to US\$5m or 2.5% of the Fund (whichever is less) per dealing day.

Fair value pricing

The board of directors of the Fund ('the board') may fair value the Fund's assets in accordance with the board's fair value pricing policies if:

- the closing market quotations or official closing prices are not readily available or do not accurately reflect the fair value of a Fund asset; or
- the value of a Fund asset has been materially affected by events occurring before the Fund's pricing time but after the close of the exchange or market on which the asset is principally traded.

The board delegates the responsibility for fair value pricing decisions to a Valuation Committee of the Investment Manager.

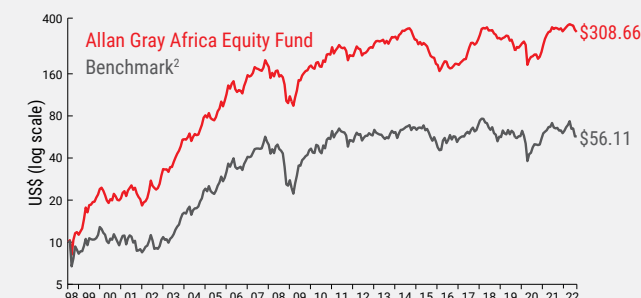

Meeting the Fund objective

The Fund aims to outperform African equity markets over the long term without taking on greater risk of loss. The Fund experiences periods of underperformance in pursuit of this objective. Since inception the Fund has outperformed its benchmark by a significant margin. The maximum drawdown and lowest annual return numbers in the 'Performance in US\$ net of all fees and expenses' table show that the Fund has not experienced more downside than its benchmark in periods of negative market returns. We believe our philosophy of buying undervalued equities should generate positive absolute returns over time.

Subscription and redemption charge

Investors may be charged 0.5% when subscribing for Fund shares. Investors may be charged 0.5% when redeeming Fund shares in the case of significant redemptions. These charges are paid into the Fund to offset the costs associated with the transactions that are borne by the Fund. The Investment Manager may waive these charges if transactions substantially offset one another.

Annual management fee

The management fee consists of a base fee of 1% and a performance component. The fee rate is calculated weekly by comparing the Fund's total performance for the week, after the base fee is deducted, to that of the benchmark.

Fee for performance equal to the Fund's benchmark: 1.00% p.a.

For each percentage point above or below the benchmark we add or deduct 0.2%. This means that Allan Gray shares in approximately 20% of the performance relative to the benchmark.

The fee is capped at 5% over any 12 month rolling period and can decrease to a minimum of 0%. If the fee would have been negative, the negative fee will be carried forward to reduce the next week's fee (and all subsequent weeks until the underperformance is recovered).

Total expense ratio (TER) and transaction costs

The annual management fee charged is included in the TER. The TER is a measure of the actual expenses incurred by the Fund over a one and three-year period (annualised). Since Fund returns are quoted after deduction of these expenses, the TER should not be deducted from the published returns (refer to page 4 for further information). Transaction costs are disclosed separately.

The second quarter of the year has seen major moves down in global equity markets, continuing a trend that started at the beginning of the year. Both the MSCI World Index and the S&P 500 ended 16% lower in US dollar terms. The sell-off, which was triggered at the beginning of the year by the Russia-Ukraine conflict and its second-round effect on global supply chains and commodities, further intensified as inflationary worries mounted, and the US Federal Reserve (the Fed) embarked on a tightening path that has, so far, been more aggressive than what was initially anticipated. African indices were not spared the wrath. The MSCI Emerging Frontier Markets Africa ex South Africa Index was down 11% in the second quarter, alongside major local indices Egypt (-20%), Ghana (-13%), Morocco (-10%) and Kenya (-22%), while Nigeria was up 9%. Over the quarter, the Fund returned -9% versus -22% for the benchmark.

It is worth dwelling on the two big drivers of the performance of the African investment universe, currencies and commodity prices, both of which have seen large swings this year. The US Dollar Index (DXY), a measure of the value of the US dollar against a basket of currencies, has appreciated 9% year to date (6% this quarter), a large move from a historical perspective. This is a result of both the Fed becoming more proactive on interest rate increases (ahead in the cycle relative to other countries) and a flight to safety in a highly uncertain environment. There is a negative correlation between the US dollar and emerging market returns. The correlation is direct, given that locally oriented companies earn local currency, and indirect, as companies struggle to pass on forex-input cost increases to customers, placing pressure on margins.

A combination of tightening global liquidity conditions (reversal of flows) and deteriorating current account balances (especially in the case of net commodity importers) has put significant pressure on some emerging countries' balance of payments. This has translated into currency weakness and a dry-up of foreign currency availability in some countries. Notable examples within the African universe include the Egyptian pound, the Ghanaian cedi and the Kenyan shilling. Egypt, one of the largest food importers in the frontier universe, devalued its currency by 14.2% in the first quarter. The Ghanaian cedi, one of the worst-performing African currencies, is down 29.4% year to date, impacted

by heightened fiscal concerns. Kenya, a large importer of fuel, saw the shilling weaken 5.9% this quarter, the currency's biggest quarterly move against the US dollar since 2015. Positions in Egypt, Ghana and Kenya comprise 6.1%, 0.1% and 2.6% of the Fund's equities, respectively, and these moves had an impact on the absolute US dollar performance of the Fund.

On the commodity front, things were different in that we have seen some trend reversal relative to the first quarter. Only oil continued to rise, with Brent crude gaining 6% this quarter, whereas industrial metals dropped significantly, due to increased fears of a recession and slowing global demand. At the end of the quarter, copper was down 22%, platinum 10% and palladium 15%. Gold also fell 7%, with its moves more negatively correlated with higher global interest rates, rather than playing the role of inflation hedge. These moves impacted the Fund's absolute performance given our positions in Zimplats and Caledonia Mining, which returned -18% and -21% in US dollars for the quarter respectively. However, on a relative basis, the commodity price movements were major drivers of outperformance during the quarter, given the benchmark's material overweight in mining stocks.

Nigerian Breweries and Société Générale Côte d'Ivoire were other contributors to performance over the quarter, up 43.6% and 15.3% in US dollar terms respectively. Equity Group and Guaranty Trust detracted from returns, delivering -12.0 and -9.6% respectively.

We acknowledge that the current global backdrop of high inflation and tighter monetary conditions presents risks to the investment outlook of the countries we are invested in, however, we believe that the Fund holds a mix of quality, highly undemanding assets that are well insulated against the prevailing exogenous shocks. The recent sell-off has strengthened our investment case for African stocks, and we are very excited about the Fund's return potential over the medium and long term.

Fund manager quarterly commentary as at 30 June 2022

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Information and content

The Fund is incorporated and registered under the laws of Bermuda and is supervised by the Bermuda Monetary Authority. The Fund is also listed on the Bermuda Stock Exchange. The primary custodian of the Fund is Citibank N.A. The custodian can be contacted at 390 Greenwich Street, New York, New York, USA. The Investment Manager has appointed Allan Gray Unit Trust Management (RF) Proprietary Limited (the "Representative") as its representative for the purpose of approval in terms of the Collective Investment Schemes Control Act 45 of 2002. The Representative is incorporated under the laws of South Africa and is supervised by the Financial Sector Conduct Authority (FSCA). The Investment Manager of the Fund is Allan Gray Bermuda Limited.

The Fund may be closed to new investments at any time to be managed according to its mandate. Shares in the Fund are traded at ruling prices and the Fund can engage in borrowing and scrip lending. The Fund may borrow up to 10% of the market value of the portfolio to bridge insufficient liquidity. This report does not constitute a financial promotion, a recommendation, an offer to sell or a solicitation to buy shares in the Fund. Investments in the Fund are made according to the terms and conditions and subject to the restrictions set out in the prospectus. The offering of shares in the Fund may be restricted in certain jurisdictions. Please contact the Allan Gray service team to confirm if there are any restrictions that apply to you.

Collective investment schemes in securities (unit trusts or mutual funds) are generally medium- to long-term investments. Where annualised performance is mentioned, this refers to the average return per year over the period. MSCI Index

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Share price

Share prices are calculated on a net asset value basis, which is the total market value of all assets in the Fund including any income accruals and less any permissible deductions from the Fund divided by the number of shares in issue. Forward pricing is used.

The weekly price of the Fund is normally calculated each Friday. Purchase requests must be received by the Registrar of the Fund by 17:00 South African time on that dealing day to receive that week's price. Redemption requests must be received by the Registrar of the Fund by 17:00 South African time, on the particular dealing day on which shares are to be redeemed to receive that week's price.

Fees and charges

Permissible deductions from the Fund may include management fees, brokerage, securities transfer tax, auditor's fees, bank charges and custody fees. A schedule of fees, charges and maximum commissions is available on request from the Representative.

Total expense ratio (TER) and transaction costs

The total expense ratio (TER) is the annualised percentage of the Fund's average assets under management that has been used to pay the Fund's actual expenses over the past one- and three-year periods. The TER includes the annual management fees that have been charged (both the fee at benchmark and any performance component charged) and other expenses like audit fees. Transaction costs (including brokerage, securities transfer tax and investor protection levies where applicable) are shown separately. Transaction costs are necessary costs in administering the Fund and impact Fund returns. They should not be considered in isolation as returns may be impacted by many other factors over time, including market returns, the type of fund, the investment decisions of the investment manager and the TER. Since Fund returns are quoted after the deduction of these expenses, the TER and transaction costs should not be deducted again from published returns. As collective investment scheme expenses vary, the current TER cannot be used as an indication of future TERs. A higher TER does not necessarily imply a poor return, nor does a low TER imply a good return. Instead, when investing, the investment objective of the Fund should be aligned with the investor's objective and compared against the performance of the Fund. The TER and other funds' TERs should then be used to evaluate whether the Fund performance offers value for money. The sum of the TER and transaction costs is shown as the total investment charge (TIC).

Foreign exposure

Contractual risk includes the risk that a counterparty will not settle a transaction according to its terms and conditions because of a dispute over the terms of the contract (whether or not bona fide) or because of a credit or liquidity problem, causing the Fund to suffer a loss. Such contract counterparty risk is accentuated for contracts with longer maturities where events may intervene to prevent settlement, or where the Fund has concentrated its transactions with a single or small group of counterparties. Borrowing, leveraging, and trading securities on margin will result in interest charges and, depending on the amount of trading activity, such charges could be substantial. The low margin deposits normally required in futures and forward trading, which the Fund may utilise, permit a high degree of leverage. As a result, a relatively small price movement in a futures or forward contract may result in immediate and substantial losses to the investor.
