

ALLAN GRAY AFRICA EX-SA BOND FUND

Fund description and summary of investment policy

The Fund invests in a focused portfolio of African (excluding South African) securities that are selected for their expected risk and return profile. The Fund may invest a substantial portion of the assets in a single country or region rather than a diversified portfolio of assets.

Fund objective and benchmark

The Fund seeks to achieve the maximum US dollar total return while minimising the risk of loss within the context of an African bond fund. The benchmark is the J.P. Morgan GBI-EM Global Diversified Index. The Fund does not seek to mirror the benchmark but instead may deviate meaningfully from this performance benchmark in pursuit of superior returns. To the extent that its investments differ from those in the benchmark, the Fund faces the risk of underperforming the benchmark.

How we aim to achieve the Fund's objective

We assess an asset's intrinsic value based on long-term fundamentals and invest where our assessment of intrinsic value exceeds the price by a margin of safety. This approach allows us to identify assets that may be out of favour with the market because of poor near-term prospects, but offer good value over the long term. The Fund's holdings may deviate meaningfully from those in the index.

Suitable for those investors who

- Seek exposure to African (excluding South African) interest bearing assets
- Are comfortable with market and currency fluctuations
- Are prepared to take on the risk of capital loss
- Typically have an investment horizon of more than five years

Capacity

The Fund currently has limited capacity. Allan Gray International Proprietary Limited (the 'Investment Manager') may, at its discretion, refuse a subscription or phase a subscription into the Fund over a number of dealing days.

Subscription and redemption charge

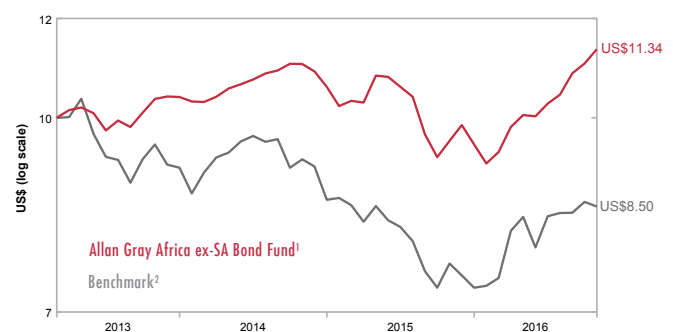
Investors are charged 0.5% when subscribing for Fund shares. Investors may be charged 0.5% when redeeming Fund shares in the case of significant redemptions. These charges are paid into the Fund to offset the costs associated with the transactions that are borne by the Fund. The Investment Manager may waive these charges if transactions substantially offset one another.

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Meeting the Fund objective

The Fund seeks to achieve the maximum US dollar return while minimising the risk of loss within the context of an African (excluding South Africa) bond fund. The Fund experiences periods of underperformance in pursuit of this objective. As the Fund is less than five years old it is too early to tell if it has met its objective. However, since inception the Fund has outperformed its benchmark and we are confident that the Fund will meet its objective over the long term.

Annual management fee

The management fee consists of a fixed fee of 1% with VAT at 0%.

Total expense ratio (TER) and Transaction costs

The annual management fee charged is included in the TER. The TER is a measure of the actual expenses incurred by the Fund over a 3-year period (annualised). Since Fund returns are quoted after deduction of these expenses, the TER should not be deducted from the published returns (refer to page 4 for further information). Transaction costs are disclosed separately.

Fund manager quarterly commentary as at 30 September 2016

The Fund has returned 16% in dollars so far this year. The main contributors have been sovereign dollar-denominated bonds issued by Zambia, Ghana and Nigeria; and oil-related corporate bonds issued by Tullow Oil and TransGlobe Energy. Nigerian banks' dollar-denominated bonds had a positive return, but underperformed the strong rally in Africa's sovereign dollar bonds.

Over the past quarter, the Fund has reduced exposure to dollar-denominated bonds and invested in Nigeria's local currency debt. Nigeria isn't a favoured investment destination at the moment, but we believe that the risk-reward outlook is changing.

At the end of August 2014, the Fund had 15% exposure to naira-denominated debt. At the time, Nigeria's oil production was over two million barrels per day, the oil price was around US\$100 per barrel (/bbl) and Nigeria had about US\$40 billion in forex reserves to support the currency peg at NGN162/US\$. We prudently halved the Fund's exposure after the oil price fell below US\$80/bbl and we had sold all naira-denominated holdings by January 2015 – the oil price had dropped to US\$53/bbl, but the naira exchange rate was fixed at NGN183/US\$.

Concurrently, we started accumulating Nigeria's dollar-denominated bonds yielding 7.5% after spreads had doubled. As we noted in our March 2015 commentary, the naira had not fully adjusted to the 50% drop in the oil price, but international bond markets had adjusted quicker than Nigeria's policymakers to the new reality. Our cautious approach proved to be prescient.

What has changed in our outlook?

The naira has lost nearly 40% of its value since the devaluation in June 2016 and is within reasonable estimates of the real effective exchange rate. Over the short run, there are lingering investor concerns about dollar liquidity in the market and the likelihood that a genuinely free floating currency could overshoot before finding its equilibrium level. Currency risks could persist if the government is unable to contain the threat from militant attacks at oil-related facilities, which has curtailed oil production.

Under ordinary circumstances, 20% yields in a currency that is close to fair value is attractive. To mitigate currency risks, we have taken advantage of naira-settled currency futures, but this doesn't guarantee the availability of US dollars when the instruments mature.

Despite the ongoing uncertainty and negative news flow from Nigeria, our analysis suggests that in most scenarios, the Fund will generate an attractive double-digit return on this investment.

Fund information

The Fund is incorporated and registered under the laws of Bermuda and is supervised by the Bermuda Monetary Authority. The Fund is also listed on, and regulated by, the Bermuda Stock Exchange. The primary custodian of the Fund is Standard Bank of South Africa Limited. The custodian can be contacted at Investor Services, 2nd Floor, 25 Sauer Street, Johannesburg, South Africa. The Investment Manager, an authorised Financial Services Provider in terms of the Financial Advisory and Intermediary Services Act 37 of 2002, is the appointed investment manager of the Fund. The Investment Manager has appointed Allan Gray Unit Trust Management (RF) Proprietary Limited (the 'Representative') as its representative for the purpose of approval in terms of the Collective Investment Schemes Control Act 45 of 2002. The Representative is incorporated under the laws of South Africa and is supervised by the Financial Services Board ('FSB').

The Fund may be closed to new investments at any time to be managed according to its mandate. Shares in the Fund are traded at ruling prices and the Fund can engage in borrowing and scrip lending. The Fund may borrow up to 10% of the market value of the portfolio to bridge insufficient liquidity. 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Share price

Share prices are calculated on a net asset value basis, which is the total market value of all assets in the Fund including any income accruals and less any permissible deductions from the Fund divided by the number of shares in issue. Forward pricing is used. The weekly price of the Fund is normally calculated each Friday. Purchase requests must be received by the Registrar of the Fund by 17:00 South African time on that dealing day to receive that week's price. Redemption requests must be received by the Registrar of the Fund by 17:00 South African time, on the particular dealing day on which shares are to be redeemed to receive that week's price. Yield

The Allan Gray Africa ex-SA Bond Fund yield is current, calculated as at month-end.

Fees and charges

Permissible deductions from the Fund may include management fees, brokerage, Securities Transfer Tax (STT), auditor's fees, bank charges and custody fees. A schedule of fees, charges and maximum commissions is available on request from the Representative.

Total expense ratio (TER) and Transaction costs

The total expense ratio (TER) is the annualised percentage of the Fund's average assets under management that has been used to pay the Fund's actual expenses over the past three years. The TER includes the annual management fees that have been charged (both the fee at benchmark and any performance component charged) and other expenses like audit fees. Transaction costs (including brokerage, Securities Transfer Tax [STT] and investor protection levies where applicable) are shown separately. There are no explicit brokerage charges in global bond markets. The broker rather takes an undisclosed spread between the purchase and sale price. The spread (charge) can vary from negligible to substantial depending on the asset and market circumstances. The disclosed transaction charge is therefore zero but in reality there are transaction costs which reflect in the Fund's returns. We aim to minimise costs by keeping our trading activity to a minimum and always seeking out the most favourable price when buying and selling assets. Transaction costs are a necessary cost in administering the Fund and impacts Fund returns. They should not be considered in isolation as returns may be impacted by many other factors over time including market returns, the type of fund, the investment decisions of the investment manager and the TER. Since Fund returns are quoted after the deduction of these expenses, the TER and Transaction costs should not be deducted from published returns. As collective investment scheme expenses vary, the current TER cannot be used as an indication of future TERs. A higher TER ratio does not necessarily imply a poor return, nor does a low TER imply a good return. Instead, when investing, the investment objective of the Fund should be aligned with the investor's objective and compared against the performance of the Fund. The TER and other funds' TERs should then be used to evaluate whether the Fund performance offers value for money. The sum of the TER and Transaction costs is shown as the Total investment charge.

Foreign exposure
